Fullmer Receives 11 Medals Posthumously

Eleven medals, badges and service ribbons, among them the Bronze Star for Valor, were presented posthumously to Pfc. Robert M. Fullmer, who was killed in action in Vietnam June 5.

Presentation of the awards was made to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. G. Otis Fullmer, 1102 23rd Ave. S., by Col. Robert L. Woodard, professor of military science, at the University of North Dakota.

Pfc. Fullmer received the Bronze Star medal with First Oak Leaf Cluster and "V" Device for heroism in connection with military operations against a hostile force. He was serving with Company B, 2nd Battalion, 22nd Infantry in Vietnam.

The citation reads, in part: "While established in a night defensive position, Company B came under a massive ground attack. Immediately, Pfc. Fullmer began placing effective suppressive fire upon the insurgent force. With complete disregard for his own safety, Pfc. Fullmer continued to expose himself as he placed effective fire on the hostile force until he was fatally wounded. His valorous actions contributed immeasurably to the success of the mission and the defeat of the hostile forces."

Additionally, Pfc. Fullmer was awarded a Bronze Star medal for meritorious service, the Purple Heart for wounds received in combat, the Good Conduct medal, the combat Infantryman's badge, the National Defense Service medal, the Vietnamese Service medal with Bronze Service Star, the Vietnamese Campaign ribbon and the Sharpshooter's badge with machine gun, automatic rifle and rifle bars.

He was actually awarded two Bronze Star medals during the ceremony for his service in Vietnam: the first for meritorious service during the period of Jan.

22 to June 6 and the second for heroic achievement in the June 5th action in which he gave his life.

Pfc. Fullmer was a 1966 graduate of Central High School and had attended Dickinson State College. He entered the Army in August 1968 and arrived in Vietnam in January 1969.

Attending the ceremony besides relatives and friends, were Commander Glyndon Thrall and Harold Traverse of Post 1874 of the Veterans of Foreign Wars.

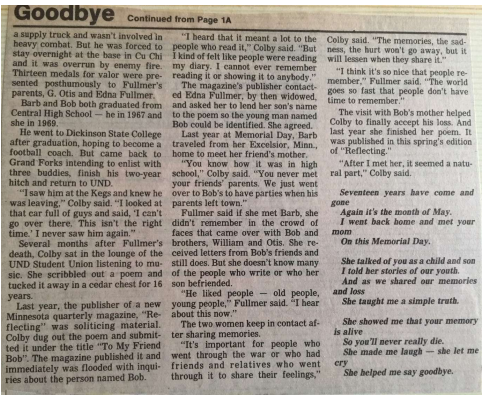

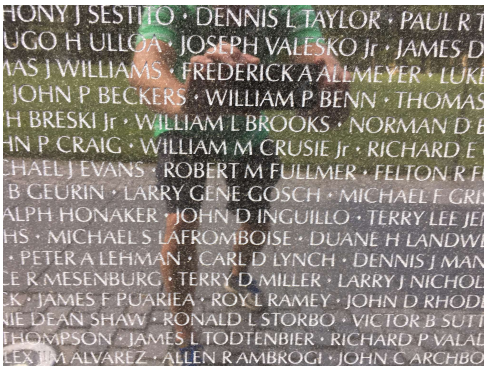
